Please visit www.socialsecurity.gov/payment for information if you receive Social Security or SSI (Supplemental Security Income) benefits. Nearly 55 million individuals receiving these benefits will get a one-time payment of \$250 by late May 2009. The payments will be automatic, so no action will be necessary. Beginning in April 2009, the Social Security Administration will be sending an advance notice to those eligible who will be receiving the one-time payment. Are You Caring for the Child of a Substance Abuser?


If you are a relative taking over the care of a child when a parent's drug or alcohol use has left them unable to take care of their own children, chances are you are in a very difficult situation.

Many issues may arise, such as:

- *how to deal with the addicted parent,
- *how to prevent the cycle from repeating itself, *dealing with your feelings, and
- *how to talk to children about the addiction.

Caregivers can easily become injured if not familiar with the proper body mechanics and techniques needed to move the person in their care. Whenever in doubt, get instruction from a therapist or nurse. After reading this issue, test your knowledge by answering True/False to the questions below:
